This group activity steps through the ways the numbered treaties were imposed on First Nations. It will give participants insight into how Canada's colonial framework of laws and society was further entrenched by treaties.
1 pm Third floor room 336	Chantal Chagnon	Traditional Indigenous Drumming, Songs and Storytelling This is a double session combining drumming with the second part focusing on Traditional medicines Participants can stay for both parts, or join in separately. The second part will flow out of the first section and won't be at a scheduled time.	Indigenous Knowledge, Science, Communications, Mental wellness, Design thinking, Skills / tools, Collaboration & peer mentoring as it relates to climate action., Something else	Chantal shares Traditional Indigenous Drumming, Songs, Storytelling, Indigenous Culture, and the History of the Drum. We will learn Traditional Teachings connected to all Aspects of the Drum and Drumming, as well as how drums have been, and continue to be Sustainably Created in a good way. We will drum together to share our voices and create a deeper connection with the knowledge shared, with ourselves and with each other. Traditional Indigenous Knowledge and Ways of Knowing create connections between many aspects of ourselves and a deeper connection and understanding to Mother Earth. Drums are a traditional instrument found in all indigenous cultures throughout the world. Drums carry powerful significance in Traditional Aboriginal culture. Chantal will share stories of how the drum came into being. Participants will learn about the hides in relation to the Medicine Wheel and how the drums and drumsticks are made. Chantal shares the significance and history of various drum weaving styles in connection to the Nations and Lands they originated from, the culture behind each style, and how each style teaches us lessons we can relate to our own lives. Chantal will also share the significance and and deeper meanings behind drumsticks. We will learn how to properly and respectfully, honour, care for, maintain and play the drum. Drums are used for healing, ceremony, connection and celebration, with each song and drum beat carrying messages and intentions of our Ancestors. Chantal shares Traditional Drumming, Songs, Storytelling, Indigenous Culture, History and Traditional Teachings. Storytelling is what connects us as all people and is an aspect of all songs, Chantal shares the stories and teachings behind the songs, breaking down each song to learn together. Together we will, drum, sing, learn songs and hear the stories behind them from several Nations including Cree, Ojibwe/Anishinaabe, Blackfoot, and Cherokee. Traditional Hand Drums made by Chantal will be provided for use. Traditional Indigenous Knowledge and Ways of Knowing create connections between many aspects of ourselves and a deeper connection and understanding to Mother Earth. Chantal shares the Teachings, Stories, History and Science behind Smudging and the Medicine Wheel. Although traditions, medicines and stories may be slightly different depending on the Nation, Region or individual sharing the teachings, the message is always of balance and healing. Chantal will share the importance of protocol and how to harvest medicine sustainably and respectfully.
